SACRAMENT OF HOLY COMMUNION

- ONE: God be with us as we journey to the table.
- ALL: And with all who travel on this day.
- ONE: Let us lift our hands and hearts in thanksgiving.
- ALL: It is a good and wondrous thing to lift our gratitude and joy.
- ONE: The time is right to thank God for the journey of these last four weeks. Together we have bravely navigated new paths and explored new ways. We celebrate God's guidance and provision.

God, the ancient scriptures tell a story of a people who do not live or travel alone. We thank you for providing the map, the compass, the light, all the tools we need to live abundantly and do your work in this world. And now as your people, gathered and journeying together we pray,

- ALL: O God, our guide and light; lead us to your table. You are our portion and supply; may we be filled with all our bodies and spirits need. We come seeking more of You. More love. More grace. More mercy. More compassion. More peace. More justice. Once we receive this heaping plate, this cup overflowing with your sweet manna, fill us with the courage and desire to offer it freely to others.
- ONE: Holy are you and blessed is your child, Jesus Christ, born in a humble stable as his family traveled the hillside looking for a safe place to lodge. As a toddler his family was forced to flee their homeland by the political orders of a tyrannical leader. Jesus offers us a map for how to live in a world of unintended borders and threats of violence.

ALL: Thank you God for a map.

ONE: As an adolescent Jesus sojourned to the holy city with family for the celebration of Passover. He stayed behind without his parents knowing; drawn to the temple and the teachers, to the questions and conversations about scripture and tradition. He offers us a compass pointing us in the direction of who and what matters most.

ALL: Thank you God for a compass.

ONE: Throughout his ministry his teachings shine a light on what it means to follow in the ways of God and the places where the Good News is most needed. Jesus is a light for us and reminds us that we, too, the church, as called to be the light for the world.

ALL: Thank you God for light.

ONE: Jesus did not run from trouble, injustice or oppression. He faced it head on, even when it made him an enemy of the state. He organized, he protested, he agitated, he spoke words of truth to power and challenge to principalities. Signs and bull horns, he gives us what we need to march for peace and justice.

ALL: Thank you, God, for tools of change and transformation.

ONE: Nazareth, Bethany, Bethesda, Bethlehem, Cana, Capernaum, Caesarea, Egypt, Emmaus, Golgotha, Gethsemane, Jericho, Jerusalem; Jesus was a traveler. He made the way by going and doing. He received and offered hospitality and welcome. Finding rest and shelter in the homes of family and friends. Inviting others to travel with him. He was a sage and a student, teaching and learning along the road. He prayed and ate, alone and with others. No meal quite like his last.

As shadows hung heavy overhead, he sat at a table with his disciples. He took the warm, fresh baked bread, broke it and said, "Take, eat, this is my body broken for you. Remember me as often as you do this." Then he took the cup overflowing with sweet fruit from the vine, prayed to God and shared it saying, "This is the cup of a new life. As often as you drink this, remember me." Eating, we remember the leaven of a new dawn rising. Drinking, we remember the cup of light, the flavor of a new day.

Holy Spirit, continue stirring among us, opening us to the light of remembrance. As we share this bread of a new day and cup of new life, may your light shine on all who hunger and thirst. Those who travel by choice and for refuge. Those who travel alone and by cover of night. Those who are separated from loved ones. Those who wait for danger to pass that they might safely journey on. Those without a map, or a compass, or a lantern, or the tools that would aid them on the way.

We remember Jesus who traveled and supported travelers, whose life and death model for us all how to make a way by doing. God continue to be our Light and our Salvation. Hold us. Guide us. Lead us. As the journey goes on, renew our strength and resolve. Resurrect our hope and joy. We thank you for your love, we praise you for all your gifts and the opportunity to offer our gifts to the world.

ALL: Amen.

ONE: This table was handmade by God and set by the hands of Jesus. The Spirit's holy hands call you forth. This table does not belong to any church, to any denomination, to any one individual. This table is open to all who journey and seek to be fed. For those worshipping with us online and for those who watch this service at a later time, this table is not limited in any way. The invitation extends to wherever you are in this moment. The healing and nourishment of this bread and cup are present in the extraordinary and everyday food and drink you consume.

As you journey forward this morning, you are also invited to place your stewardship pledge cards in the basket. This invitation is not compulsory. If you are a guest with us or if you are simply not ready to take this step, you are invited to come forward to pause at the basket, to thank God for the gifts you've received and ask for insight on how and where you can share your gifts with the world.
