INVITATION TO WORSHIP

Welcome to week 5 of our Lenten journey. Our worship theme this year, guiding our way toward Holy Week in these most wilderness of days, is "Seeding the Soil: Contemplative Practices for Sustaining Our Spirits."

Looking back to week 2, we learned about Lectio Divina, *divine reading*. Today we will explore Visio Divina, the contemplative practice of *divine seeing*. This ancient prayer form invites us to focus with all our senses, not simply sight, on images around us. Using curiosity and wonder to consider what these images reveal to us about God, one another, our own lives and journeys. On this Sunday as we celebrate the Environment, commit ourselves to working for justice for all people and all of creation, and share in Communion there is no lack of images for us to contemplate. As we move through this service, let our attention wander to the earth, creation, the table, the bread, the juice, and the people and the values that make up and tend to the soil of Central. What possibilities do you see? What seeds are beginning to sprout?

SCRIPTURE John 12. 1-8

Six days before Passover, Jesus went to Bethany, the village of Lazarus, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. There they gave a banquet in Jesus' honor, at which Martha served. Lazarus was one of those at the table. Mary brought a pound of costly ointment, pure nard, and anointed the feet of Jesus, wiping them with her hair. The house was full of the scent of the ointment.

Judas Iscariot, one of the disciples—the one who was to betray Jesus—protested, "Why wasn't this ointment sold? It could have brought nearly a year's wages, and the money been given to poor people!" Judas didn't say this because he was concerned for poor people, but because he was a thief. He was in charge of the common fund and would help himself to it.

So Jesus replied, "Leave her alone. She did this in preparation for my burial. You have poor people with you always. But you won't always have me."

CONTEMPLATIVE PRACTICE Visio Divina

Around the perimeter of the Sanctuary, the Green Team assembled three tableaus representing rivers, woods, and prairies. Those worshiping in person are invited to move around the sanctuary and to gaze at the tableaus and engage in Visio Divina. For those worshipping online, the Green Team has provided images that will be shared. You are encouraged to use the instructions and prompts below to guide your meditation.

Gaze with Wonder – Let your eyes rest on the scene or image. Notice colors, shapes, and movement without analysis. What draws you in?

Reflect with Heart – What emotions or memories arise? How does this part of creation speak to your soul?

Pray with Creation – Offer gratitude, lament, or praise. What is God revealing? Pray for the land, water, and creatures.

Act with Love – How is this vision calling you to respond? Commit to one action to honor and protect creation.

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

ONE: God be with you. **ALL: And also with you.**

ONE: Open the eyes of our hearts.

ALL: We open them to the wonders of Creation. ONE: Let us give gratitude to the God of Creation.

ALL: It is good to give our gratitude.

ONE: It is a good thing to recognize the beauty of Creation. In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Wind and water, light and dark, day and night, sun and moon, sky and stars, dry land and sea; seeds, plants, trees, fruits; birds, fish, cattle, creepy crawlers, wild animals, and humankind all created in God's image. Six days of creating followed by a day of rest. God looked around and said, "indeed, this is all so very good."

And so we, as members of God's creation, pause to marvel at the world around us and join in the unending hymn,

ALL: Holy God of gentleness and grace, the universe is filled with signs of your glory. Blessed and good is everything and everyone you have made. Blessed are you, and blessed is our sibling, Jesus Christ.

ONE: When the Spirit led Jesus into the wilderness, he walked the path lined with the same dust from which all Creation was formed. For 40 days and 40 nights he prayed and fasted, reflecting on the past, contemplating the present, and preparing for the future. Today, we too are wandering this wilderness of Lent, reflecting on the journey that brought us to this place, contemplating the beauty and the suffering around us, preparing for an unknown tomorrow.

On the night that he surrendered, Jesus took the bread, gave thanks, sliced it, served the disciples saying,

ALL: "gaze upon this, see the wheat and grain, the labor that went into mixing and preparing the loaf. Take. Eat. Remember."

ONE: When the plate of bread had been passed, Jesus raised the cup, saying,

ALL: "see the seed that produced the fruit and work of those who turned the grapes into the wine. Take. Drink. Remember."

ONE: Let us remember that last meal and the invitation that brings us to this table. May this wondrous feast be a reminder of the mystery of faith,

ALL: Christ has died; Christ has risen; Christ will come again.

ONE: Spirit fall fresh on us gathered together and on these gifts of bread and cup. May they be for us visual signs and physical samples of the goodness of God. Move among us; healing hurts and divisions; calming fears, stirring community and a collective commitment to creating a world where no one hungers or eats alone.

LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT STATEMENT

Central United Methodist Church acknowledges that the building in which we carry out our collective life together occupies and is built upon land that is part of what was first known as Waawiyaataanong ("At the curved shores."), the ancestral and contemporary homeland of the Three Fires Confederacy, but which is now referred to as Detroit. In 1807 the Ojibwe, Odawa, Potawatomi, and Wyandot nations granted use of these sovereign lands to the US government through the Treaty of Detroit. Central United Methodist Church affirms the continued Indigenous sovereignty over these lands and honors all tribes with a connection to Detroit. We commit ourselves to working together with our native brothers and sisters to advance equity in all dimensions of life and to promote a better future for the earth and all its peoples.
